### QUANTIFIERS

 Indicate how much/many (un/countable nouns – expressions of quantity) there are:

a few, a little, many, much, a lot of, some, any, enough, ...

all examples
both parents
many people
each person
every night
several computers
few excuses
enough water
no escape

#### **DISTRIBUTIVES**

- Show different ways of looking at individuals within a group (how something is distributed / shared / divided)
- refer to a group or every individual in the group:

each, every ... to talk about the <u>individual members</u> of a group all ... collectively talks about the <u>whole group</u> half ... talks about the <u>divided group</u> either, neither ... talk about a <u>group of two</u>

He got **each** man out safely. **All** milk was spoiled.

## NUMERALS (as determiners)

- Numerals are determiners when they appear before a noun
- cardinal numbers (cardinals): refer to an exact number
   two, three, twenty, forty books
- ordinal numbers (ordinals): refer to an order in a sequence

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first, second, 1st 2nd, 3rd, ...
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first impressions
second chance
third prize
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• subclass of ordinals - words not directly related to numbers >> general ordinals: last, latter, next, previous, subsequent, ...

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next week
last orders
previous engagement
subsequent developments
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## WH-/DIFFERENCE/DEFINING DETERMINERS

Wh-: primarily to make questions (WH question words)

What size are you?

<u>Difference</u>: **other** (sg. or pl.), **another** (sg.) ... refer to something different, or remaining:

What **other** colours can I get this in?
Is there **another** colour that this is available in?

<u>Defining</u>: **which**, **whose** ... indicate which thing or person is being referred to:

This is the man whose window you broke

This is the man **whose** window you broke.

#### ORDERING OF DETERMINERS

- functional elements of structure rather than a formal word class
- normally precede adjectives in NPs
- when you use **multiple determiners** in a row:
- all and both in front of other determiners:
  - We ate [all the food]. [Both my sons] are at college.
- what and such in front of a and an in exclamations:
  - [What an awful day]! I've never seen [such a crowd]!
- quantifiers <u>after</u> other determiners.
  - [His many successes] made him famous. They have [no more food].
  - [What little money] I have is yours.

#### **CLASSES OF DETERMINERS**

Predeterminer	Central Determiner	Postdeterminer	Noun
all	my	many	friends

• Depending on their <u>relative position before a noun</u>, we distinguish three classes of determiners.

**Predeterminers:** specify quantity in the noun which follows them

- Multiplying expressions, including expressions ending in times:
   twice my salary
- Fractions: *half* my salary, one-third my salary
- All / both: *all my salary, both my parents*

**Central Determiners:** <u>articles</u>, <u>possessives</u>, <u>demonstratives</u>:

all the book, half a tank, all my life, twice that size

Postdeterminers: cardinals, (general) ordinals, quantifiers:

the **two** children, my **next** project, our **several** friends, my **next two** projects, **several other** people
