Read the following text and then fulfil the tasks below. You can use the following etymological dictionary to help you identify the origin (and the number of morphemes) of some of the words: http://www.etymonline.com/.

The other <u>teachers</u> in the school were known as Stephanie and Joan and so on, <u>but</u> to her class she was very <u>strictly</u> *Miss* Susan. *Strict*, in fact, was a word that <u>seemed</u> to cover everything about Miss Susan and, in the <u>classroom</u>, she <u>insisted</u> on the *Miss* in the same way that a king <u>insists upon</u> *Your Majesty*, and <u>for</u> pretty much the same reason.

Miss Susan wore black, which the headmistress <u>disapproved</u> of but could do <u>nothing</u> about <u>because</u> black *was* a <u>respectable</u> color. She was young, but with an <u>indefinable</u> air of age about her. She wore her hair, which was <u>blond-white</u> with one black streak, in a tight bun; the <u>headmistress</u> disapproved of that, too – it <u>suggested</u> an Archaic Image Of <u>Teaching</u>, she said, with the assurance of <u>someone</u> who could pronounce a capital letter. But she didn't ever dare disapprove of <u>the</u> way Miss Susan <u>moved</u>, because Miss Susan moved like a tiger.

It was always very hard to disapprove of Miss Susans in her presence, because if you did, she gave you a Look. It was not in any way a <u>threatening</u> look. It was cool <u>and</u> calm. You just didn't want to see it again.

The Look <u>worked</u> in the classroom, too. Take homework, another Archaic Practice the headmistress was <u>ineffectively</u> against. No dog ever ate the <u>homework</u> of one of Miss <u>Susan's students</u>, because there was something about Miss Susan that went home with <u>them</u>, the dog brought them a pen and <u>watched imploringly while</u> they <u>finished</u> it, instead. Miss Susan seemed to have an <u>unerring</u> instinct for spotting <u>laziness</u>, and effort, too. Contrary to the <u>headmistress's instructions</u>, Miss Susan <u>did</u> not let the children do what *they* <u>liked</u>. It <u>had turned</u> out to be a lot more <u>interesting</u> for <u>everyone</u>.
